## 听 看 闻 尝 摸

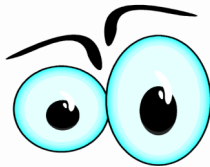

Click on the pinyin to hear how these words sounds in Chinese.

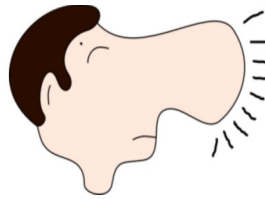
听 tīng (hearing)



看 kàn (sight)



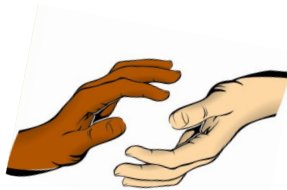
闻 wén (smell)
